16. DIY Microwave

19. On-the-Go Drain Plug

21. Bedside Laptop Desk

An ironing board is a perfect shape to hang over a bed to act as a table. We really don't give ironing boards the credit they deserve.

You might also be able to stream your phone to your hotel's TV, depending on what type of phone you have and what type of TV the hotel has. Apps like the Hotel Cast app can help with this. If you have a streaming stick or a USB cable, you might be able to connect it that way.

22. Makeup Traveler

Materials Needed: Contact lens holder

Taking a bevy of bottles along with you can be weighty as well as inconvenient, especially when it comes to make-up. Instead of packing it all, why not try and find an empty contact lens holder.

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For those who aren't familiar, contact lens holders are pretty ubiquitous and cheap. Whenever you buy a lens solution, you get a contact lens holder for free. This hack works especially well for liquid highlighter, blush, and bronzer, as you won't be wearing large quantities of those (compared to foundation or primer).

You can dispense just the right amount of make-up into the holder, seal it, and away you go. You've got more room for other items and you don't have to worry about leaks and spillages. It's a wonderful world we live in, isn't it?

23. Keep the Power On When You're Out of the Room



Some rooms are designed so that the power only stays on when the keycard is in the holder. It's essentially a power-saving tool for the hotel so that they don't drain the electricity unnecessarily. However, for guests, it can be a nuisance. If you want to leave your phone on charge while you pop out, all you need is a train ticket.

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Stick the train ticket into the holder and you might be surprised to learn that the power stays on. Unfortunately, this hack isn't fail-proof as some of these designs only recognize the keycard of the hotel. It's still worth a try.

You can also try a gift card, spare debit card, or anything else you feel comfortable sticking into the slot and giving a whirl. If you find that it doesn't work, you can always buy a battery charging case on Amazon. You'd be surprised at how cheap they are, costing under \$30, which is around the same price as an Apple charger.

24. Makeshift Clothes Steamer

Materials Needed: Shower and a hanger

If you want a perfectly steamed outfit but don't want to pay for the privilege, look no further than the bathroom. Turn on the shower to the hottest setting, leave your outfit on a hanger in the room, and close the door.

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In around ten minutes, the steam from the shower will have eased out all the wrinkles. Not only is it cheaper than using the hotel's service, but it's quicker, too! You can even do this at home to save time.

Note that if you're trying the shower steam tactic, you don't need to keep your clothes in there for more than 20 minutes (so, the length of the average shower). Depending on the fabric, you might even be able to steam it for less. Just keep checking periodically to see if the wrinkles have disappeared.

25. Butter Defroster

Materials Needed: Toaster

It's even better when you've got your very own toaster, but the little packets are often rock hard and really difficult to spread. 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While you're making the toast, put the butter packets alongside the top. They will absorb the heat and soften, making it much easier for you to consume. That's how you get your day off to a flying start.

You can also leave the closed butter packets on top of the kettle or the ironing board if you're *really* determined to get soft butter. Note that, according to *Healthline*, if you're using salted butter, you actually don't have to keep it cold because the risk of bacteria growing in it is lower.

26. Front Desk Phone Charger

More than likely, they'll have one from a box for free. That saves you buying a new charger, which usually costs anywhere from \$15 to \$20 (more, if you want one that won't break immediately).

27. Travel with Alcohol Wipes

Materials Needed: Alcohol Wipes

Estimated Savings: N/A

28. DIY Hamper

Most people have probably already tried this one, as it's a way to keep your hotel room clean. We're all used to having a hamper in our homes, and that hamper is a convenient way to get dirty and worn clothes out of the way of the room.





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Unfortunately, hotels don't come with a hamper. However, they do come with a plastic dry-cleaning bag. The bag is usually found hanging in the closet. It's free to take, and you can use it to keep your clothes from piling up. This way, your room won't get messy or cluttered.

The nature of sugar scrubs makes them slightly harsh, so this is something that you won't want to do every day. But, if you're trying to get makeup removed and need an extra boost, mix the sugar in with your facial wash.

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

33. Slip Them a \$20


