Travel Tips -

Germany

Germany is situated in the heart of Europe. Starting in the north, there is the North Sea and the Baltic coastline and numerous islands. The adjoining plains are covered by hills and lakes and to the south are wooded highlands traversed by great river valleys. Germany's southern border is defined by the mighty Alps.

The treasures and highlights of a centuries-old culture await you in all the regions of Germany: castles, palaces, cathedrals, cloisters and historic cities whose old burgher houses on winding romantic streets are surrounded by city walls with gates and turrets. And of course there is Berlin, Germany's capital.

Climate

Germany has a predominantly moderate climate with a summer temperature of 70° F (22° C) and an average winter temperature of 14°F (-12°) to 32°F (0°). Best months for outdoor swimming are June, July and August. Winter sports are enioved from December to March and until April in the Alps.

Time

Germany is on Central European Time (CET) which is 6 hours ahead of Eastern Standard Time and 9 hours ahead of Pacific Standard

Entering Germany

Required Documents: As a rule. for a U.S. citizen, only a valid passport is required to enter Germany. Residents of other nationalities please contact your nearest German Consulate.

Children may either be included on their parents' passport or travel with their own passport. No passport photo is required for children under 10 years of age.

For detailed information please contact your nearest diplomatic or consular representative of the Federal Republic of Germany.

Visas: In most cases no visa is required for those who intend to stay in the country for less than 3 months and do not plan to work.

Health Requirements: No immunizations are currently required for visits to Germany.

Animals: A health certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian in a period 12 months to 30 days prior to entry is required when you bring dogs and cats into the country. A notarized German translation of this certificate is also necessary.

Currency Regulations: German Marks (DM), foreign currency and other forms of legal tender may be imported and exported from Germany in unlimited amounts.

Customs

Private cars: No duty is levied on your private car provided it does not remain in the country after you leave.

Gifts: Gifts and commodities for your personal use or consumption may be brought into the country duty free providing the total value does not exceed DM 115 and the total value of goods from EEC (European Economic Community) countries is no more than DM 780.

The following limits apply to selected items. Imports from EEC countries are in parenthesis.

Tobacco: 200 (300) cigarettes or 100 (150) cigarillos or 50 (75) cigars or 250 (400) grams of tobacco or corresponding combined amounts of these items such as 100 cigarettes and 50 cigarillos.

Alcohol: 1 (1.5) liters of alcoholic beverages above 44 proof or 2 (3) liters of alcohol less than 44 proof or 2 (3) liters of sparkling wines or corresponding combined amounts plus 2(5) liters of other wines.

Perfume: 50 (75) grams - about 1.76 (2.64) ounces - of perfume and .25 (0.375) liters of eau de Cologne.

Coffee,Tea: 500(1000) - about 1 (2) pounds-of coffee or 100(200) - about 7 (14) ounces - of tea or 40 (80) grams - about 1.4 (2.8) ounces - of instant tea or corresponding combined amounts.

The duty free tobacco and alcoholic beverage allowances are authorized for persons age 17 and above; the coffee quota for persons age 15 and above. If items from EEC and other countries are imported at the same time, the amount listed in parenthesis is the maximum total duty free allowance.

If purchases are made in a tax free/duty free shop, only the regulations on imports from non-EEC countries apply.



Tax Free Shopping

The price of goods you purchase in Germany includes 15 % value-added tax (VAT). In order to receive a refund of some or all of this tax when you leave the country you can follow these procedures:

 Stores which display a "Tax Free" sticker work with the Tax Free Shopping Service. They will issue you a Tax Free Shopping Check at the time of purchase. When leaving the country, before you check your baggage (customs will want to examine what you purchased), have your check stamped by the German Customs Service as your proof of legal export. You may then be able to obtain a cash refund at one of the Tax Free Shopping Service offices which are located in the major airports and many train stations and some ferry terminals.

Otherwise you must send the checks to: Tax Free Shopping Service, Mengstrasse 19, 23552 Luebeck, Federal Republic of Germany. (Please state whether you want the payment to be credited to your bank card or to your bank account).

• In other cases, ask for a special export invoice which will state what you bought and what you paid. When you leave, again make sure you have your forms approved by the customs service while you still have your luggage (customs will want to see what you purchased). Then you must return the forms to the store for reimbursement, generally received as credit on your bank card.

- In exceptional cases, Germany's Consulate General in the U.S. and Canada may be able to help you.
- All duty free allowances are authorized only when items are carried in the traveler's personal baggage.



Money

1 German Mark (DM) = 100 Pfennig (Pf)

Electricity

220 volt, 50 cycles. Bring an adapter plug for use in electrical outlets as well as a transformer for electrical (except for dual-voltage) equipment.



Postage

Foreign: Information at postal counters; international letters up to 20 grams approximately DM 3.00; postcards DM 2.00.

Domestic: Letters up to 20 grams cost DM 1; postcards DM 0.80.

Post Offices: Usually open from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. and from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. Monday - Friday and 8 a.m. to 12 p.m. on Saturday. Railway and airport terminal post offices, found in all major cities are open week-

days until late evening. General delivery mail may be picked up upon presentation of a valid identity card or passport. Telegraphed money orders from abroad are paid in DM.

Letterboxes are easy to spot by their bright yellow color.



Telephone

Local and long distance calls may be placed from telephone booths located in post offices and public areas. The unit charge for coin operated public telephones is DM 0.30. All towns and cities in Germany may be dialed directly by using the prefix listed in the telephone directory above each local heading. Post and money exchange offices sell telephone cards for DM 12 and DM 50, tobe used on all coinless phones.

Although telephone calls may be made directly from your hotel room (approximately DM 0.65 per unit and up), for long distance calls, it is usually more economical to call collect, ask to be called back or use public international telephone booths. Telephone cards can also be used for international calls.

Credit cards are generally not accepted but some of the international hotels accept the AT&T calling card. "USA Direct" can be used with all telephone cards and for collect calls. The number from Germany is 01 30 00 10. "Canada Direct" can be used with Bell Telephone card and for collect calls. This number (from Germany) is: 01 30 00 14

Telephone Calls to Germany from the US and Canada can be made by dialing: **0 11 49** plus the city area code.



Shops and Businesses

Hours: Although the hours shops and business are open vary from one state to another, retail stores are generally open from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday-Friday and in some cases until 8:30 p.m. on Thursday. Also shops are generally open from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday except for the first Saturday of the month when they may remain open until 4 p.m.

Beauty Pariors: Usually closed on Mondays.

Travel Agencies: Open from 9 a.m.-6 p.m. Monday - Friday and 9 a.m.-12 noon on Saturday. Closed Sunday and holidays.

Pharmacies: Open during normal business hours but all post locations of pharmacies which are open nights, Sunday and holidays.

Physicians: Office hours vary from physician to physician. Appointments are usually required. In emergencies, call the "Aerztlicher Notdienst" (Medical Emergency Service) which is listed in any telephone directory. You can also call the Police Emergency & Rescue Service number 110. (Ask for an English - speaking person).

Banks: Open Monday-Friday 8:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m.; 2:30 p.m.-4 p.m. (Thursday 2:30 p.m. - 5 p.m.). Closed Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

Money Exchanges: Located at airports, border crossing points and major railway stations. Hours are generally from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Theater Performances: Performances usually begin at 8 p.m. although longer shows may start as early as 7 p.m. Tickets for concerts, theater performances and other events are available at advance ticket offices and the theater box office. Your hotel concierge will be happy to assist.

Special Events: Once a year, in April and October, the GNTO (German National Tourist Office) publishes a "Calendar of Events". This handy booklet lists dates of trade fairs and exhibitions, theater and music performances, local and folk festivals, sporting events, conferences and congresses in Germany. Contact your GNTO office.



Fairs, Conventions, Exhibitions

Many cities, beach resorts and spas offer state-of-the-art facilities for conferences, conventions, congresses, meetings and trade fairs. For information on fairs, conferences and exhibitions which are taking place in Germany, please contact your nearest GNTO office.

Germany by Car

With its ultra-modern Autobahn network (super highways) covering approximately 6,520 toll-free miles, Germany boasts one of the world's most advanced highway systems. Dotting these sophisticated highways are 169 restaurants and 268 service stations open 24 hours a day.

Tourist information boards are posted at each of these locations. In addition to the super Autobahn, there is a dense network of state highways and secondary roads enabling motorists to easily reach all parts of Germany.

Traffic Signs: Easy-to-understand international road signs are in use throughout the country.



Speed Limit: There is no speed limit on the Autobahn (super highways) unless posted. The suggested speed limit for cars (up to 2.8 tons) without trailers is 130 km per hour (81 mph). Cars towing trailers are limited to 80 km/h (50 mph). On regular highways, the speed limit is 100 km/h (about 62 mph) and in cities and towns 50 km/h (31 mph).

Safety Tips:

- · Safety belts must be worn at all times by those riding in the front and back seats.
- · Drivers and passengers of twowheel vehicles going more than 24 km/h (15 mph) must wear helmets.
- · Passing is permitted on the left side only.
- · Basically, driving after drinking is prohibited. (Maximum permissible blood alcohol content is 0.8 pro mille).
- Children 12 years of age and under are not allowed to ride in the front seat when a vehicle has rear seats.
- · Low-beam headlights are required in darkness, fog, heavy rain and snowfall.
- Driving with parking lights is strictly prohibited.

Vehicle Documents: •

Visitors from America and Canada may drive in Germany for one year with a national or international driver's license. The national license must be accompanied by a translation issued from one of the following offices:

- · German diplomatic offices
- International motor vehicle offices in the country where the license was issued
- · German automobile club (ADAC, AvD or DTC: addresses on page 7)

If you remain in Germany for more than one year, you must obtain a German driver's license. As a rule, you will be able to get this license upon presentation of your foreign driver's license.

No operator's license is required for motorbikes if the country of origin does not require such a permit. However, it is recommended that you obtain an international registration permit to avoid unnecessary delays should there be any ques-

Vehicles from abroad must display their country's license plate on the rear.

Liability Insurance: Vehicle liability insurance is required by law in Germany, Motorists from abroad must either present the green international insurance card or take out temporary liability insurance at the point of entry into the country.

Insurance coverage available at the point of entry can be purchased for 15 days or one month. Should the insurance coverage expire, you may apply for an extension at automobile club offices located throughout the country.



Travel Services: The following German Automobile Clubs offer 24hour breakdown and towing services, as well as highway patrols. The highway patrol services all Autobahn and federal highways. Emergency call boxes are placed at regular intervals along the Autobahn, Look for a small arrow along the highways for the location of the nearest box. Information is also available at major border crossing points.

ADAC offers an additional travel service: In cases of special emergencies, motorists traveling in Germany may be contacted by radio announcements from the "ADAC Reiseruf" (Travel Service Broadcast). The channels are indicated on signs on the Autobahn.

If you want to page someone who is traveling on the road, you may call any of the ADAC offices or police stations and your message will be broadcast over this special channel.You may also call: ADAC Tel. (089) 22 22 22 .

Car Rentals: Rental cars are available from all major car rental companies and German-based companies. Reservation offices are located at airports, major railway stations, and in major city centers. Generally, car rentals are more economical when prepaid in the U.S. and Canada. Minimum age to rent a car ranges from 19-25 depending on the car rental company. Maximum age averages around 70.

More than 100 international airlines serve Germany. Lufthansa German Airlines, the national carrier, has the greatest number of flights linking almost 1000 cities throughout the world with Germany. Germany's International Airports: Germany's commercial airports are linked with one another by:

- Lufthansa and Eurowings, Hamburg Airlines and Deutsche (German) BA scheduled services.
- Charter services with fixed departures (i.e. Frankfurt to Flensburg, Kiel, Luebeck, Muenster, Kassel, Bayreuth and Hof and in the summer, flights to the Frisian Islands, Helgoland, etc.).
- Special taxi flights on request between all German commercial airports including regional airports and local landing strips.

Special Lufthansa Services: From Frankfurt/Main, all Lufthansa destinations in Germany can be reached in an average of 50 minutes with at least four flights daily. Contact your travel agent or Lufthansa for the most economical current fares.

Lufthansa and German Rail offer special train service between the Frankfurt airport and Duesseldorf city with stops at the Central Rail Stations in Bonn and Cologne. Trains also travel to Stuttgart in the south.

The service is available to passengers with valid Lufthansa tickets. These train connections augment the existing timetable and offer special services to Lufthansa passengers.



Germany by Rail

As of May 28, 1995, a new policy makes it possible for passengers to make advance seat reservations. Passengers receive a meal voucher in the train so they can choose their meals and beverages.

LH-Bus Service: From Frankfurt airport to Mannheim and Heidelberg and vice versa.

Luggage Lockers: Lockers for storing luggage are available at almost all train stations and airports.

Fly/Drive:Both flight and rental car can be booked together for added economy and travel convenience. Your car may be returned to another rental location at no extra charge.

Transfer Service: All German passenger airports have public transportation services into town. Some provide their own shuttle service (i.e. bus or direct train) for faster connections between city centers and airports.

German Rail (DB) has check-in desks for luggage located in many airports. At the Frankfurt/Main airport, the rail and underground station is found at the lower level. From there you have excellent connections into the city center's main rail station as well as direct service to Bonn, Cologne, Dortmund, Duesseldorf, Koblenz, Nuremberg, Wuerzburg and other cities. From the Frankfurt/Main rail station, you will find train connections to other parts of the country. Transferring with the underground (S-Bahn) is an easy 11-minute ride to and from the airport/main rail station. The trains run every 10 minutes.

Germany has an extremely dense network of railway lines covering 27,000 miles. With over 20,000 departures, more than 30,000 passenger trains crisscross Germany daily bringing people safely and quickly to their destinations.

Comfortable coaches ensure that your journey with German Rail is a pleasant one. All towns of any size can be reached by rail, and in connection with railway buses, even the smallest villages are easily accessible.

Connections: The high speed ICE (InterCity Express) connects, for example, Hamburg or Berlin with Frankfurt and Munich. Other IC (InterCity) trains provide direct connections between 50 cities, every hour from 6:00 a.m. to midnight (in some cases every half hour).

Dining Car: All IC and ICE trains and many express trains on the domestic and international railway system provide meal service in a designated car. On short journeys, snack vendors travel throughout the train.

Sleeping Cars: Most overnight trains offer single -, double - and triple - berth compartments as well as 1st and 2nd class couchettes. The new InterCity Night (ICN) even offers sleeping compartments with private bathrooms and showers.

Reservations: Seat reservations are necessary on selected IC, EC and ICE trains, and sleeper reservations on overnight trains. All reservations are subject to a modest reservation fee.

Tickets: Point-to point tickets bought in the U.S. or Canada are valid up to 6 months.

Luggage: Items may be taken into the coaches free of charge as long as they can be placed above or under the seat. Luggage checking facilities, storage lockers, and baggage carts as well as porters are available in most train stations.

Bicycles: For an additional fee, bicycles can be taken on the train provided there is a baggage car. Bicycles can also be rented at many train stations for cycling excursions into the countryside.

Purchasing Rail Tickets: Pointto-point tickets may be purchased from your travel agent or upon your arrival in Germany at the train station. German Rail, Euro and Eurailpasses must be purchased in the U.S. or Canada prior to your trip. The following passes are available:

German Rail Pass: Offers unlimited 1st- or 2nd-class rail travel in Germany for any 5, 10 or 15 days within a one month period.

German Rail Twin Pass: Special companion rates for two people traveling together. The first person pays full fare; the companion receives more than a 50 percent discount.

German Rail Youth Pass: A discounted 2nd-class junior pass for those over 12 and under 26 years of age. Included with the German Passes are these special bonuses:

• Free travel on KD River Day Steamer on the Rhine between Duesseldorf and Mainz; on the Main between Mainz and Frankfurt; on the Moselle between Cochem and Koblenz. Free travel on regional bus lines of the German Rail Transit Authorities (Omnibus-Verkehrsgesellschaften der DB).

 Free travel on buses operated by Deutsche Touring/Europabus, including the "Castle Road" and "Romantic Road" tours.

Eurailpasses, Eurail Saverpasses and Eurail Flexipasses may be purchased for 1st class train travel in 17 European countries. Validity ranges between 5 days and 3 months.

Eurail Youth Passes are good for 2nd class train travel only. Included with these passes are the above listed bonuses except the free admission to the Museum of Transportation in Nuremberg.

Taxis

Cab fares are made up of a basic flat rate plus a charge per kilometer. Rates vary from place to place as do surcharges for baggage and pets. Meters are required. Please note it is not customary to hail a cab. Look for taxi location signs or phone.

Streetcars and City Buses

Fares, which vary depending on the route, are generally around DM 2.00 to DM 3.00. Please note that if the bus has no conductor (subways/ U-Bahn for example) tickets must be purchased at the bus stop before boarding. Ticket vending machines are located at every station. Please be aware that if you're found without a valid ticket you can expect a fine.
